

## **About the Book**

When seventeen-year-old seamstress, Josephine Nimetz, agrees to take care of a WWI amputee in a remote Alaskan lodge, there's enough friction to melt the Mendenhall Glacier. Her position is only until June, and it pays well enough to overlook the hardship of managing a rustic home and a shell-shocked veteran.

Geoff Chambers makes it clear that he isn't too fond of the "runt" sent to take care of his needs, nor of her painful mistakes. Dealing with a depressed and addicted veteran, pushes Josephine to the brink of leaving, if not for the money her salary brings.

But Josephine is a perfectionist, determined to get Geoff back on his feet—figuratively...Although, sending a rich, handsome veteran back into society may cost Josephine the man she has grown to love.

Discussion:

Question 1: 1. Have you ever taken care of someone who had a lot of needs? What was that like for you?

Answer 1: I have taken care of people who had injuries. It can be draining and tiring to meet someone's needs, especially for long periods of time.

Question 2: 2. Josephine travels to the lodge and forfeits seeing her family for several months. She even misses celebrating Christmas with her mom and sister. Have you spent extended time away from family? Is it a good thing, or a difficult endeavor?

Answer 2: Spending time away from loved ones can be beneficial. You realize how much they mean to you. But, loneliness can set in, too. A support team and new friends can help you battle loneliness.

Question 3: 3. Josephine grows up in a family where her stepfather has issues with addiction. Addictions can take over lives and ruin them. Have you ever dealt with addiction? Have you had addiction in your family? What was that like for you?

Answer 3: I had family members with addictions and several holidays were ruined because of alcohol-laden fights. I still get tense around people who have had too much to drink. Addictions are frightening. Prayer and professional help is required.

Question 4: 4. Have you ever been to Alaska? What do you think it is like? What descriptions stood out to you when you read "Until June?"
